APPENDIX II

Listing of nursing home-related COVID-19 congressional and oversight activity to date.

In the months before the pandemic began, Members of Congress in both parties—particularly in the Senate—were working on matters related to nursing homes. They included <u>Sens. Chuck Grassley</u> (<u>R-IA</u>) and Ron Wyden (<u>D-OR</u>), then the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Senate Finance Committee, as well as Finance Committee members <u>Sens. Bob Casey (D-PA</u>) and Pat Toomey (<u>D-PA</u>). Throughout the pandemic, these senators and others in Congress have been monitoring the state of the nation's nursing homes.

March 2020	Then-Ranking Member of the House Ways & Means Committee, Rep. Richard Neal (D-MA) and Sen. Wyden, <u>wrote to CMS</u> to "express our growing concern" about the COVID-19 pandemic and alleging that what the Members perceived as regulatory rollbacks would weaken nursing homes' response to the pandemic.
May 19, 2020	Sen. Casey and several Senate Democrats introduced the <u>Nursing Home COVID-19</u> <u>Protection and Prevention Act</u> . The bill would provide \$20 billion for states and tribes to offset the cost of cohorting individuals with COVID-19 in congregate living facilities, including nursing homes, and require data collection regarding COVID-19 infections in these facilities.
May 20, 2020	The Government Accountability Office (GAO) issued a report titled "Infection Control Deficiencies Were Widespread and Persistent in Nursing Homes Prior to COVID-19 Pandemic." GAO found that infection control and prevention deficiencies were the most common types of deficiency cited in nursing home surveys.
May 21, 2020	The Senate Committee on Aging held a hearing titled "Caring for Seniors Amid the COVID-19 Crisis."
May 2020	House Energy and Commerce Health Subcommittee Chairwoman Anna Eshoo (D- CA) and Reps. Jan Schakowsky (D-IL), Donna Shalala (D-FL), Madeleine Dean (D-PA) and Seth Moulton (D-MA) introduced the <u>Nursing</u> <u>Home COVID-19 Protection and Prevention</u> <u>Act</u> . The legislation would provide \$20 billion in part to states and nursing homes, and provide for additional technical assistance.
May 2020	GAO released a report performed at the request of Sen. Wyden titled " <u>Infection Control</u> <u>Deficiencies Were Widespread and Persistent</u> <u>in Nursing Homes Prior to COVID-19</u> <u>Pandemic</u> ."

December 2020	Sens. Wyden and Casey released a report titled " <u>The Cost of Inaction: 19 Deaths an Hour</u> and Rising," the findings suggesting rising numbers of COVID-19 cases in nursing homes and workforce shortages, demonstrating "the continuing cost of inaction by the Trump Administration."
December 2020	The HHS Office of Inspector General (OIG) released a study titled " <u>Onsite Surveys of</u> <u>Nursing Homes During the COVID-19</u> <u>Pandemic: March 23-May 30, 2020</u> ." The OIG found that states were concerned for several reasons, including challenges in securing adequate protective equipment and backlogs of standard surveys and complaint surveys. The OIG also recommended CMS revise the Focused Infection Control Survey tool, among other things.
