

# Climate Policy Update

September 12, 2022

**Good evening!** This is Akin Gump's <u>weekly policy newsletter</u> on **climate change** policy and regulatory developments, providing information on major climate policy headlines from this past week and forthcoming climate-related events and hearings:

#### **National**

- New Fed Banking Chief Targeting Crypto and Climate Change as Top Priorities (CNBC)
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  - During a speech on Wednesday, the Federal Reserve's Gov. Michael Barr delivered a speech outlining his priorities, including a goal for the Federal Reserve "to better assess the long term, climate-related financial risks facing the largest institutions."
- <u>Biden-Harris Administration Launches Portal to Help Communities Assess Exposure to Climate Hazards</u> (NOAA)
  In partnership with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the Biden-Harris administration launched a "new website to help communities across the nation understand the real-time climate-related hazards in their area, analyze projected long-term exposure to those hazards, and identify federal funds to support climate resilience projects for their communities."
- <u>Clean Energy Projects Surge After Climate Bill Passage</u> (The New York Times)
  - After the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, multiple corporations have launched large-scale clean energy projects. Toyota announced a \$2.5 billion investment in a North Carolina factory "to produce batteries for electric cars and hybrids." Similarly, Honda and LG Energy Solution launched a joint effort "to build a \$4.4 billion battery factory." A mining company, Piedmont Lithium, asserted it would build a plant to process lithium for batteries while First Solar, a solar panel manufacturer, committed to investing \$1.2 billion to building a new factory in the United States.
- <u>Manufacturers Push Regulators for More Natural Gas Pipelines</u> (E&E News)
  - Manufacturers penned a letter to lawmakers calling for a correction at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to become "active proponents of new infrastructure." The letter highlights concern "over natural gas priced heading into the winter, when increased demand from utilities and export facilities for heating and power generation may strain existing pipeline capacity even further and skyrocket what they see as already untenable prices."

- <u>To Decarbonize Industry, DOE Road Map Focuses on Efficiency, Electrification and Low-Carbon Fuels</u> (Utility Drive)
  Department of Energy (DOE) Secretary Jennifer Granholm announced the Industrial Decarbonization Roadmap, identifying key pathways to effectively reduce emissions in the country's most energy-intensive sectors—chemical manufacturing, petroleum refining, iron and steel, food and beverage, and cement and lime.
- Renewable Energy Contributed 24 Percent of Generation in H1 2022 (North American Windpower)
   Within the first six months of the year, renewable sources accounted for 24 percent of the U.S. electricity generation. Over the same time period last year, renewable accounted for 21 percent of U.S. electric generation.

State

- <u>Sixty-One Dems Say Virginia's Participation in RGGI Is Up to Legislature</u> (*Richmond Times-Dispatch*)
  In the wake of the Youngkin administration's plan to remove Virginia from the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), 61
  Virginia Democrats drafted a letter to the Air Pollution Control Board opposing the regulatory proposal. Further, the letter argues that the Governor's plan is "improper and illegal," as Virginia's participation in RGGI is a decision for the General Assembly to make.
- <u>Future of Virginia Air Board Committee in Question</u> (Virginia Mercury)

  The Virginia Air Pollution Control Board's Committee on Public Engagement may be in danger after "a new law went into effect transferring permitting powers form the air board to the [Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)]." Before the aforementioned law went into effect, controversial permitting decisions could have moved from DEQ to the air board. Now, DEQ can "convene additional public hearings on a permit if it is requested by 25 people or if a permit is deemed controversial under a new definition."
- <u>California's Electricity Demand Breaks All-Time Record During Severe Heat Wave</u> (PBS)
   As California experienced "record-breaking" temperatures, the California Independent System Operator (CAISO) reported that the state's electrical demand set an "all-time record." The state implored consumers to limit energy use during peak hours in an effort to prevent sustained power outages.

International

Climate Change Could Worsen Supply Chain Turmoil (The New York Times)

A drought in southwestern China has hindered various international supply chains that are reeling from COVID-19 disruptions. Economists and trade experts have warned that such natural disasters "could soon become more frequent for companies that source parts and products from around the world as climate change, and the extreme weather events that accompany it, continue to disrupt the global delivery system for goods in highly unpredictable ways."

• Egypt Is Hosting COP27. Can It Become Africa's Climate Champion? (Council on Foreign Relations)
As this year's Conference of the Parties (COP27) draws closers, the host country, Egypt, "appears to have organized COP27

around the goal of increasing climate finance, or investment in efforts to adapt to the consequences of climate change and mitigate greenhouse gas emissions."
