2015 Pro Bono Scholars Program

Started in 2008, the Akin Gump Summer Pro Bono Scholars Program is a two-summer program for top law students who show a strong interest in making pro bono an integral part of their Akin Gump careers. The Pro Bono Scholars are rising second-year law students who work both at the firm and at a public interest organization during the summer. The next (rising third year) summer, the Pro Bono Scholars are members of the firm's regular summer associate program.

In 2015, the Pro Bono Scholars Program will take place in our Dallas, Houston, Los Angeles, New York, and Washington, D.C. offices.

FIRST SUMMER: Following the first year of law school, the Pro Bono Scholars will spend at least seven weeks at a public interest organization. In past years, the firm has placed Pro Bono Scholars directly with organizations with which the firm works, while other Pro Bono Scholars have obtained their public interest positions independently. The Pro Bono Scholars will also spend four weeks with the firm working on pro bono matters; providing substantial responsibility and training in areas in which the firm focuses its pro bono practice.

SECOND SUMMER: The Pro Bono Scholars will be part of the Akin Gump Summer Associate Program for rising third-year law students in their assigned offices. The summer program includes pro bono opportunities as well as a commercial workload. Like all other summer associates, Pro Bono Scholars are eligible for consideration for an offer of future employment as an associate after completing the second summer at Akin Gump.

COMMITMENT: The firm expects Pro Bono Scholars to return for a second summer (following the second year of law school) to gain experience in the firm's commercial practice. Accordingly, Pro Bono Scholars will be exempted from the on-campus interviewing process during fall of their second year. In the event that the Pro Bono Scholar's performance does not meet the firm's standards, the firm may decline to have the scholar return for the second summer or to make an offer of future employment as an associate.

QUALIFICATIONS

Open to exceptional law students completing their first year of law school in 2015 and who expect to graduate from law school in late 2016 or by summer 2017. Applicants must have all the qualifications expected of a summer associate, including a strong academic background, demonstrated leadership qualities, and a commitment to developing into a successful law firm associate.

COMPENSATION

Pro Bono Scholars are paid the summer associate salary while employed by the firm and receive a stipend totaling \$17,000 for their time spent working at a public interest organization. The Pro Bono Scholars receive the first half of the stipend (\$8,500) when they begin work at the public interest organization. The second half of the stipend (\$8,500) is paid upon the Pro Bono Scholars honoring the commitment to return to the firm as a summer associate following their second year of law school.

APPLICATIONS

First-year law students interested in this program must submit an application in order to be considered. The firm will accept applications between January 2, 2015 and February 6, 2015. The application should include a resume, transcript (uncertified is acceptable) and writing sample. In addition, each candidate is required to submit a short statement (no more than 500 words) describing his or her interest in having a career at Akin Gump and making pro bono a part of his or her practice.

You will need to upload the above listed required documents at the end of the application process. The firm recognizes that first semester grades at some law schools are not released until early February; accordingly, we will accept applications with the transcript to be sent once it is released.

Candidates may apply to, and be considered by, only one Akin Gump office. The firm will only consider applications that contain all of the requested documents and offers will not be extended before the firm has received the applicant's full transcript. Decisions are made on a rolling basis and we expect the selection of the 2015 Pro Bono Scholars to be completed by early March.
